Critical thinking presupposes our having a sensitivity to language and a knack for its effective use, for logic and language are inseparable. It also presupposes our having a healthy respect for the firm factualness of the world in which we live, for logic is about reality. Finally, critical thinking presupposes a lively awareness of how the facts that are our ideas relate to the facts that are the objects in the world, for logic is about truth.

Whether regarded as a science, an art, or a skill—and it can properly be regarded as all three—logic is the basis of our ability to think, analyze, argue, and communicate. The Critical Thinking Series, part of our Beyond High School Series, breaks logic down to its essentials through clear analysis, accessible examples, and focused insight.

Each session will consist of a presentation and exercises that will guide the participants in developing clear and effective reasoning.
